I am the first graduate of USL. I certainly did not plan to be the only student in my class, but I am glad to have had the unique opportunity of being the only student in my grade for my last two years of high school. When USL opened, my family was one of the founding families of the school, and my younger brothers were among the students who enrolled in its inaugural year. From that first year, the teachers and administrators created a loving, nurturing atmosphere which was reflected in the excitement my brothers had for their new school. My brothers loved their new school and their enthusiasm was contagious. Therefore, the summer between my 10th and 11th Grades, my parents gave me the choice of staying at the school I was in or moving to USL. I had to weigh the ramifications of this decision: I would have to adjust to a new environment for my last two years of school; I would have to "prove myself" to new teachers; I would have to leave friends behind for a likely much smaller class. What pushed me to eventually make the decision to move was the opportunity to experience something new. I also knew that I would receive hands-on, individualized learning.

When I started 11th Grade, I ended up being the only student in that level,

and subsequently I was the only student to graduate the following year. It definitely felt odd to go from a class of around 40 to just me! However, being the only student in my grade had a lot of advantages. As the only student at my level, my learning was accelerated; I completed the English curriculum at the beginning of my final year and was then allowed to study German for the rest of the school year. I was given special privileges, like private tennis lessons for my PE class. I was allowed to learn in a block schedule, which left time for independent study and reading. Although I was the only student in 11th Grade and the following year in 12th Grade, I was integrated with the rest of the high school students for activities, field trips, and of course recess. I did not feel alone; I felt valued and special, and my confidence grew. While some may view changing schools an inconsequential decision, my experience taught me to be comfortable to make decisions based on what is best for my own well-being. I will forever be grateful for the two years I spent at USL. I received a wonderful education, had some unforgettable experiences, and most of all learned how nurturing and fulfilling school can be when you are lucky enough to have teachers who care so much. The confidence and self-reliance I gained from my years at USL have served me well as I have gone on to complete an MS in Computer Science at the George Washington University in the USA and a PhD in Education from Keele University in the UK. I am now an Assistant Professor in the Education Department at the University of Balamand with publications to my credit. I chose education as my professional career path in no small part due to the influential role models I had at USL. the New England Association of schools and Colleges (NEASC) and was awarded accreditation in 2009. Since that time the process of self-improvement continued, hosting a Five Year Visit in 2014 and a Preparatory Visit in 2017. In the meantime (and

In the meantime (and since then), many staff members served on NEASC visiting teams to accredit other schools. In 2018 LWIS-USL hosted a second Visiting Team (VT) and was awarded re-accreditation.

LWIS-USL received authorization to deliver the International Baccalaureate Diploma Program (IB-DP) in December 2019. The IB-DP started being implemented in September of this year and new plans are being undertaken to expand the premises in order to provide more rooms and more facilities to accommodate for this new program.





What is Symbolism?




This is a model project that was provided by the teacher to stimulate students' thoughts and aspirations.












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Water Cycle Bag Activity
